

Oscar Night: The Shape Of Water

Sun. 24th February 7.30pm

As the stars gather in Hollywood, we will gather in The George to see the winner of last year's Best Film Award.



It is the tale of a lonely janitor working in a high-security American government laboratory, who develops a unique relationship with an amphibious creature that is part of a top secret experiment.

Directed by Guillermo del Toro and starring Sally Hawkins.

The Square (Swedish, Danish & English) (2017)

Tue. 26th March 7.30pm

A satirical comedy-drama set in Stockholm. A prestigious museum's chief of art curator finds himself in both professional and personal crisis as he attempts to set up a controversial new exhibit. The aim of the installation is to remind passers-by of altruism and our responsibility to others. But he finds it is not always easy to live up to one's ideals! Oscar Nominated in 2018 for Best Foreign Language Film. It stars Dominic West alongside the Scandinavian cast.



Cold War (Polish with subtitles) (2018)

Tue. 25th April 7.30pm



Set against the background of the Cold War in the 1950s in Poland, Berlin, Yugoslavia and Paris, the film depicts an impossible love story in impossible times.

With beautiful cinematography, haunting and illuminating, Cold War was nominated for several awards including Best Screenplay and Best Film not in the English Language at the 2018 BAFTAs. Also nominated for three Oscars in 2019 including Best Foreign Language Film.

Spring Special: double bill and meal

It's circus time!

Our first film is *Trapeze* (1956). A crippled circus acrobat, (Burt Lancaster), only the sixth person to accomplish the triple somersault, is torn emotionally between two ambitious young trapeze artists. One is a talented American (Tony Curtis) and the other is a less gifted but beautiful Italian (Gina Lollobrigida). Tensions rise as a love triangle forms.

After our meal we will see the highly acclaimed musical drama *The Greatest Showman* (2017).

Starring Hugh Jackman as PT Barnum, the film traces the ambition and genius of this extraordinary man - beginning with nothing but on a mission for fame, which he achieved with the launch of the now world famous Barnum Circus with its unique and daring acts. But will he lose sight of the most important aspect of his life, his family, and risk all to be accepted?

Peterloo (2018)

Marking the 200th anniversary of one of the most notorious episodes in British history, *Peterloo* is an epic portrayal of the events surrounding the massacre where government forces attacked a peaceful pro-democracy rally in Manchester. It proved to be a defining moment in the development of British democracy and played a significant role in the founding of The Guardian newspaper. Directed by Mike Leigh.

Black Panther (2018)

This superhero film is based on the Marvel Comic character and is the first of its kind to have a predominately black cast. Nominated for seven Oscars including Best Motion Picture, the fantasy adventure is the story of the hidden but advanced African kingdom of Wakanda, as its new king T'Challa steps forward to lead his people into a new future. When two foes conspire to destroy the country, Black Panther must team up with a CIA agent and Wakanda's special forces to prevent it being dragged into a world war.


Tue. 18th June 7.30pm



Neruda (Spanish with subtitles) (2016)

Mixing history with fiction, the film shows the dramatic events of the brutal suppression of communists in Chile in 1948, based around the life of Pablo Neruda, a Senator, former ambassador and well known poet (later being awarded the Nobel Prize). Neruda speaks out against repression and is forced to become a fugitive in his own country, hunted by a police inspector who feels he needs to get to know his prey, so immersing himself in Neruda's poetry.

Bohemian Rhapsody (2018)



A foot-stomping celebration of Queen, their music and their extraordinary lead singer Freddie Mercury. They attain unparalleled success, but unexpectedly Mercury, surrounded by darker forces, shuns the band to pursue a solo career. He reunites with them in time to lead Queen into one of the greatest performances in the history of rock music, at the Live Aid Concert (1985), while bravely facing his recent diagnosis of AIDs. Nominated for five Oscars including Best Actor & Best Motion Picture.
