To launch our 2017/18 season we turn to that giant figure of Hollywood, Dustin Hoffman. First on the menu is the classic *Midnight Cowboy* (1969). Naive Joe Buck (Hoffman) arrives in New York, preening himself as a real 'hustler', only to find himself instead the victim of hustling. But in the process he makes his first ever real friend (Jon Voight) as together they face the hostile world of the big city. The film received an Oscar as Best Film, and features highly on the list of greatest films

ever.

Tootsie (1982) follows. A talented actor is finding it impossible to get work because of his reputation as being difficult. So he adopts a new identity as a woman - and 'she' is brilliant. However some interesting situations ensue! Tootsie received ten Academy nominations, including Best Film, with Jessica Lange winning Best Actress in a Supporting Role.

La La Land (2016)



This magical old school romance traces the fortunes of aspiring actress Mia and ambitious jazz player Sebastian as their dreams of success begin to come to fruition – along with

the problems that soon unfold.

Starring Ryan Gosling and Emma Stone, the film was a huge hit at the 2017 Academy Awards, winning six Oscars and being nominated for eight more. The film is described as a 'boost of sunshine'.

Chinatown (1974)

Starring Jack Nicholson and Faye Dunaway and directed by Roman Polanski, this classic thriller is the story of Private Detective Jake Gittes, who specialises in matrimonial cases. Hired by the beautiful Evelyn Mulwray to spy on her husband, he is plunged into a complex web of deceit, including murder and municipal corruption. The film won three Oscars.

Bicycle Thieves (1948) (Italian with subtitles) Thur.30th November 7.30pm



In post war Italy, a struggling working class man at last gets a good job, for which he needs his bicycle. But then it is stolen. The desperate father and his plucky young son set out to find it, combing the streets of Rome. The film was granted an Academy Honorary Award in 1950. was voted one of the greatest films of all time, and 50 years later was still ranked the sixth greatest film ever.

Beauty And The Beast (2017)

This wonderful fairy tale has been newly adapted, with a dazzlingly star studded cast. Emma Watson and Dan Stevens take the main roles, but amongst many other distinguished actors, look out for Ian McKellen, Emma Thompson, Stanley Tucci, Ewan McGregor and Kevin Kline. Belle, an independent young woman and lover of books, bravely takes her father's place and becomes the prisoner of an ugly 'beast'. The age old story is enchanting, the production is magical.

Winter Special: double bill and meal

To brighten the winter blues, we offer a trip to Venice!



First up is Death In Venice (1973) an intense and moving portrayal of tortured composer Gustave Aschenbach (loosely based on Mahler). Set in the early twentieth century, he is a frail middle-aged man in ill health who travels to Venice to seek rest after a period of artistic and personal stress. He is fascinated by the concept of beauty, and becomes obsessed by a beautiful Polish teenage boy staying in his hotel. Starring Dirk Bogarde.

After our meal we return for *Don't Look* Now (1973), a psychological thriller based on a story by Daphne Du Maurier. A married couple grieving the recent death of their young daughter are in Venice when they encounter two elderly sisters, one of whom is a psychic & brings a warning from 'beyond'. Starring Julie Christie and Donald Sutherland, it is one of those films once seen, never forgotten.



Lion (2016)

This is the true, powerful story of a young five year old boy from a happy rural family

in India who becomes lost in Calcutta, 1500 miles from home. Eventually he is adopted by an Australian couple and grows up in Tasmania, surrounded by love but haunted by memories of his early life. After twenty five years he sets out to find his lost family. The film stars Dev Patel (Slumdog Millionaire) and Nicole Kidman, and received six nominations, including Best Film, at the 2017 Academy Awards.

After the sudden death of his older brother. Lee, played by Casey Affleck, is made legal quardian of his 16 year old nephew. He returns to his hometown and is forced to deal with a tragic past that had separated him from family and community. This 'beautifully and richly textured drama' received numerous award nominations, winning two Oscars for Best Actor and Best Screenplay and a Golden Globe for Best Motion Picture - Drama.
